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A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD OF ALDERPERSONS

RECYCLE CENTER INFORMATION

As we debate the issue of using a single trash hauler in Byrnes Mill, we are also considering options for curbside recycling. We have found there are challenges for the trash haulers to profit from recycling, so by making it a requirement, the cost for service increases substantially. Many residents want to recycle, but rather than make it a mandatory item in the bid, we have decided to make it optional.

The Recycling center on Lower Byrnes Mill Road services about 110 patrons a day and collects over 50 Tons of recyclables per month. Of the 110 patrons, only 20% are Byrnes Mill residents. We are providing recycling service to a wide area of surrounding communities in Jefferson County, which is a good thing, but this should not be provided at a cost to the city to operate. We will continue to provide this service if the City is not incurring excess costs. We do get a large grant to help sustain the center but it is still costing us about \$10,000 a year. If we are going to accept that we are the main recycling facility in this area of Jefferson County we need to do some things differently. We must increase our staff to monitor the growing number of users and what is being tossed into the bins.

There are new restrictions on what can be collected as qualified recyclable material. Studies show that one in four items placed in the bins are not recyclable. For example; a pizza box with grease & scraps, a detergent or fabric softener bottle gets included in the bin, the entire load is considered contaminated. We pay the cost of taking it to the landfill, and everyone's effort to recycle gets wasted for that load. This year we have submitted a grant request for \$137,000 to cover the expenses we anticipate. If we get this we can continue to operate the Center. Once we find out, residents can better decide if they want to pay the extra cost to have curbside recycling included in their trash service. The Recycling Center is free to use, staffed with friendly attendants, and only a short drive from anywhere in the City. We hope you will use it in the future.

MEET CHIEF FRANK T. SELVAGGIO

We are excited to introduce Chief Frank T. Selvaggio who comes to Byrnes Mill Police Department with 37 years experience in law enforcement. He most recently served with the Washington University Police Department for the past nine years where he was a Lieutenant and Commander for the Bureau of Investigations and Special Services. He previously worked for the Clayton Police Department, retiring as a Sergeant after 28 years of service. He is a former member of the Greater St. Louis Major Case Squad and graduate of the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia. Chief Selvaggio is looking forward to getting to know residents of the community while continuing to build his team.

PUBLIC WORKS UPDATES

FRANKS ROAD: PHASE II

The City is working with FEMA to complete Phase II of the Franks Road project. Phase I focused on the uphill slope where this phase will repair the lower slope reinforcement.

“WE HAVE PROVIDED ALL RECEIPTS AND DOCUMENTATION TO FEMA AND ARE WAITING TO HEAR BACK ABOUT REIMBURSEMENTS AS WELL AS THE POSSIBILITY OF ADDITIONAL AVAILABLE FUNDING,” SAID CITY ADMINISTRATOR DEBBIE LAVENTURE.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS:

The following Capital Improvement projects have been COMPLETED:

- Patches to Lower Byrnes Mill Rd. from Hwy 30 to Franks Rd.
- Replacement of 3 failing culverts on Upper Byrnes Mill Rd. near Lower Byrnes Mill Rd.
- Replacement of 4 failing culverts on Lower Byrnes Mill Rd. from Franks Rd. to the City limits.

In addition to adding new street signs (some have already been added), the following Capital Improvement projects are SCHEDULED:

- Repair Hallmark Drive
- Crack seal Osage Executive Circle
- Repair water issues and pavement in the 6100 block of Franks Rd.

ADDITIONAL PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS

The Public Works Department continues to trim trees and pick up litter on the Byrnes Mill roadways. Additionally, expect to see cleanout and repairs to culverts along Franks Rd., Lower Byrnes Mill Rd., Upper Byrnes Mill Rd. and other City roadways. Public Works is requesting the community's support in keeping the roadways clean on a regular basis.

We will happily accept glass, glass doors and windows, refrigerators (doors off), washers, dryers, hot water heaters, furniture (light enough for 2 people to carry), and paint cans (only if completely dried out).

Please no hazardous materials, computers, monitors, TV's, building supplies, lumber, and railroad ties.

All Residents are encouraged to clean up their properties. Tags can be purchased in advance and volunteers will come pick up tagged items. Tags may be purchased at City Hall:

⇒ Pick-up load(s) of items - \$30.00 each in advance; \$40.00 each the day of the clean-up

⇒ White items (appliances) - \$5.00 each in advance; \$7.00 each the day of the clean-up

⇒ Tires - \$5.00 each in advance; \$7.00 each the day of the clean-up

⇒ Mattresses - \$10.00 each in advance; \$15.00 each the day of the clean-up

To purchase tags, please visit City Hall during regular business hours (Mon.- Fri. - 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.). After purchasing tags, put them on your items and have them out by the curb to be picked up by volunteers. You may also bring items yourself and pay at the Recycling Center (4197 Lower Byrnes Mill Rd.) the day of the clean-up.

Volunteers are needed to donate their time and/or truck to help pick up and dispose of unwanted items and to pick up trash along Upper and Lower Byrnes Mill Rd. and Franks Rd. To offer your services or equipment, please call Byrnes Mill City Hall at 636-677-7727 and mention "Community Clean-Up Day". Food and drink will be provided at the end of clean-up for all volunteers.

MAYOR (2-YEAR TERM)



Rob Kiczanski—As Mayor, I hope to be elected to continue my work with the Board of Alderpersons to further advance the progress made in Byrnes Mill. COURTESY NOTICES

Operation Clean Stream

Mark your calendars for **Saturday, August 24** if you're interested in joining the community's **Operation Clean Stream (OCS)** team. Known as the country's largest and longest running river restoration project, OCS is a group that repairs damage which occurs to area streams, tributaries and rivers due to flooding, trash and littering. The local group will clean the 2 ½ miles of river from Rockford Beach to Byrnes Mill Park. According to area coordinator, Rob Kiczenski, the local team removes an average of 100 tires per year from the river as well as other trash and debris. Some boats are available but volunteers are encouraged to bring their own boat or canoe.
